15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Affiliated with the University of Kerala, TKM College of Arts and Science is strictly bound to adhere to the university's academic approaches. Moreover, the college has not yet been granted autonomous status. However, the institution is always keen to quickly adapt to the shifts in the university's approach and the fast changes in the field of education. Hence, despite the aforementioned constraints, the institution has developed an interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary academic approach. The revised curriculum of the university is a remarkable move towards integrating humanities and science. Hence, science students are offered courses to enable them to develop professional language skills and make them aware of contemporary sociopolitical issues. Moreover, the institution looks forward to making the curriculum more professional to enable multiple entry and exit benefits. Likewise, the institution is keen to make its research programs more diverse and modern by incorporating an interdisciplinary approach to focus on society's most pressing issues and challenges. The institution's best practices regarding interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary approaches include the following: The academic Enhancement Program of the institution targets the advanced level students from all the different departments of the institution. The program is intended to cater to the diverse aptitudes and skills of the students, irrespective of their departmental and academic backgrounds, in such a way that enables them to pursue their passion in an informed manner. In this regard, programs like lecture series, workshops, conferences, etc, are conducted with an interdisciplinary orientation. Another remarkable mechanism the institution developed is increased academic collaboration between DST FIST-funded departments.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The institution does not have academic autonomy and hence adheres to the norms put forward by the University of Kerala, to which it is affiliated. To usher in interdisciplinarity in education, measures are taken to introduce students to courses offered by various departments in the college and to opt for one as an Open Course. The college has been a recognized local chapter of SWAYAM NPTEL since 2019, and students are encouraged to enroll in various courses. Students can garner course credits from this MOOC platform

by implementing the Academic Bank of Credits. Moreover, efforts are being taken by the institution to promote academic collaborations between colleges and universities to enable research and learning. This academic networking would, in the future, facilitate multiple entries and exits and inter-college alliances in education.

17.Skill development:

Skill development has become an important focus in the revised curriculum of the University of Kerala. All the students of the institutions, irrespective of their specializations, are offered courses for their skill development. In doing so, soft skills like presentation and interview skills, general language skills such as listening, speaking, reading, and writing, and writing for special purposes like writing for media and academic writing, etc., are integrated into the curriculum. Hence, the students who enroll every year are enabled with the skills required for both their personality and professional development. Moreover, all these students are offered courses on pressing contemporary issues such as gender justice, secularism, professional ethics, human rights, environmental protection, sustainable development, and cyberspace. It helps to inculcate positivity and civic sense among the students.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The current curriculum of the University of Kerala integrates to a certain extent the Indian knowledge system including its language and culture. In addition to offering specialized study programmes in Malayalam and Hindi languages and literatures; Malayalam, the mother tongue, is employed to teach science and social science subjects as part of the multilingual approach of the institution. The institution also takes effort to integrate the Indian tradition and culture through such programmes as International Yoga Day celebration, Yoga training for students etc. under such banners as NSS and NCC of the institution. Moreover, in its capacity as the local chapter of SWAYAM – NPTEL project of MHRD, Govt. of India, the institution makes sure that Indian knowledge system oriented courses are available for the students. In so doing, the institution also contributes to India's development towards becoming a knowledge society and economy.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome-based education (OBE) is the primary mission that the institution strives to achieve. Affiliated with the University of Kerala, the institution adheres to the university curriculum, where outcome-based education is a significant focus. To align with this

goal, the institution proactively adopts measures to ensure an outcome-oriented approach. The IQAC oversees the implementation of this policy by ensuring that the Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs) are clearly defined for all programmes and courses. It also implements innovative strategies for outcome attainment and its systematic mapping. To monitor and enhance student performance, a linear scale is periodically prepared to categorize students as advanced, average, or slow learners. This is achieved through various methods, including regular class tests, internal examinations, seminars, assignments, end-semester projects, and mock vivas. Additionally, feedback from alumni, teachers, employers, and parents is gathered to evaluate the effectiveness of outcome attainment. The institution employs Campus Genie, a Learning Management System (LMS), to map and analyze the attainment of POs, PSOs, and COs based on the aforementioned methods.

20.Distance education/online education:

The institution is affiliated with the University of Kerala, which provides opportunities for online and distance education. In line with this, the institution also offers online distance learning programs, including the Post Graduate Diploma in Counselling Psychology (PGDC) and the Certificate Course in Library and Information Science (CLISc). To keep pace with the rapid advancements in education, the institution has adopted a blended learning approach. During the lockdown period, the institution effectively transitioned to online education. The IQAC played a key role in this shift by organizing digital teaching training sessions for faculty members, equipping them with the skills to use online platforms and resources efficiently. Departmental-level orientations further supported this initiative. These training sessions enabled faculty and students to make effective use of various ICT tools such as Moodle, Google Classroom, Quizizz, Webex, Zoom, and Microsoft Teams. A noteworthy practice of the institution in the context of online education is its effort to ensure access for underprivileged students. The institution utilized its computer labs and upgraded its Information and Communication Technology (ICT) infrastructure to support students lacking access to online learning resources.

<p>TKM College of Arts and Science, affiliated to the University of Kerala, has implemented Choice Based Credit Semester System for all the programmes it offers. The College Council, in association with the IQAC prepares the Academic Calendar of the College, and the Master Timetable every academic year for the planned execution of the curriculum. Academic Council and department-level Board of Studies for Certificate courses monitor the conduct of the courses offered by various departments, and reinforce effective curriculum delivery. The college has separate wings for the conduct of internal and external examinations. An effective feedback system works at the college. The feedback on the performance of the teachers and their effectiveness in curriculum delivery is also taken. The methods of teaching, teaching plan, and the extracurricular activities of the teachers are recorded and are monitored by the HODs and the Principal. 1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

The college integrates contemporary social issues and perspectives related to professional ethics, gender, human values, environment, and sustainability into the curriculum in multiple ways. The General English courses titled Writings on Contemporary Issues and Environmental Studies and Disaster Management, offered to all UG students in the college, exclusively deal with human rights, environment and sustainability, and gender. In addition, the college addresses these values by conducting seminars, extension activities, outreach programmes, day observances, campaigns, workshops, camps, debates, club activities, and association programmes. An exclusive course on gender, titled Gender Studies, is prescribed at the graduation level. Courses on environment and sustainability are offered by various departments, covering ecology and ecosystems, biodiversity and its conservation, sustainable development, natural resources and their conservation, industry and environment, waste management, human population and human health, environmental pollution, environmental legislations/organizations, environmental chemistry, and green chemistry. The college strictly adheres to the Green Protocol on all initiatives and events on campus. Annual Green and Environmental Auditing is conducted with the help of an external

consultancy . The college places the utmost emphasis on empathizing with the weaker sections of society, ensuring equality and equity. Due importance is given to professional ethics, cyber ethics, research ethics, and social ethics in the syllabus.

Question paper setting, conduct of internal examination, valuation of answer scripts, assignment of invigilation duty and other works connected to Continuous Internal Evaluation is coordinated by the Centralised Internal Examination Wing under the supervision of Chief of Internal Examination. An Internal Exam Squad ensures prevention of malpractices. All examination halls are under CCTV surveillance to monitor the smooth conduct of exams. Students who are unable to attend the internal exam due to ailments, poor health, home quarantine etc. and those attending NCC/NSS camps or other intercollegiate competitions are given the option of retests. Class tutors keep a track of attendance progress of students and those with a low percentage of attendance are preinformed. PTA meetings, to discuss student performance, are conducted after the timebound evaluation and distribution of answer scripts. Grievance related to internal examinations and marks allotted for the same are forwarded to Grievance Redressal Cell and effective measures are taken to assuage them. The consolidated internal mark sheet is finally uploaded to the university via internal marks portal after three-tier verification.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

There is a three-tier mechanism to resolve matters at the root level. Tier 1 includes the respective course coordinators who grade answer scripts, evaluate assignments and seminars of respective courses in a programme. Tier 2 comprises the Class Tutor who consolidates the marklists and verifies the same before uploading it to the university portal. Tier 3 is Head of the Department who addresses grievances left unresolved at the tutor level. If the complaint persists after this, it is forwarded to the Grievance Redressal Cell(s). The institution has separate cells for university and internal exam related grievances. Google form provided on website too.

Results of Internal Examinations are presented to students for verification and the same is posted in their Google Classrooms/WhatsApp/Telegram class groups to ensure transparency and fairness. A real-time feedback system is implemented in each department for recognizing the flaws regarding the conduct of any exam and troubles, if any, faced by a student. Collecting feedback from the students creates a sense of belongingness, seriousness and responsibility in their approach towards exams and indispensable measures are taken by the Department and College authorities. All the steps in the examination process are planned to make it as transparent as possible.

In addition to the programme and course outcome (POs and COs) stipulated in the University prescribed syllabus, the faculty (under the guidance of IQAC) prepares a detailed list of outcomes for efficient CO/PO mapping. The College website furnishes this detailed list of POs, PSOs and COs of every programme/ course. POs and PSOs are displayed in department notice boards to make the students acquainted and familiarised with them. The College Handbook/Calendar also contains the same information while

delineating the expected level of intellectual attainment at the completion of a programme.

The institution ensures dynamic implementation of OBE through discussions at tutorial and mentorship levels. The various assessment tools for measuring Course Outcomes include - centralised internal examinations, tutorials, assignments, project works, seminars/presentations etc. There is constant reinvention of teaching-learning and assessment methods based on the target level attainment data from previous batches' performance and progression. The 360 degree feedback system implemented at the institutional level is another chief means of devising and implementing OBE-related changes. Feedback on the attainment of PSOs and POs is specifically adjudged and the drawbacks and difficulties are periodically informed to the University of Kerala through teacher representatives in the Board of Studies.

College has devised an exclusive Internal Assessment Policy which serves as the foundation for all outcome-based teaching and learning. It prescribes a three-pronged approach in mapping and analyzing the attainment of outcome. Progression based Assessment Class Tutors maintain a file detailing the higher education and career progression of each exit batch; the same helps in assessing the attainment of POs and PSOs. The proof of progression details regarding the same is collected and consolidated at each department. Periodic Assessment This includes regular class tests and internal examinations, seminar and assignments, end-semester projects, mock viva at the beginning of each academic year, teachers consolidate a repository of questions based on specifications of the Bloom's Taxonomy and the Course Outcomes listed in the corresponding syllabus. LMS is used to map PO/PSO/CO based on CIE marklists and the question papers. Mapping-based Assessment Course outcome attainments of students are presented on a linear scale. Advanced and slow learners are arranged at the respective ends of the spectrum on the basis of percentage of

attainment.

The college has two kinds of programmes at the institution-level to facilitate advanced and slow learners: AEP (Academic Enhancement Programme) and CARE (Counselling Assistance and Resources for Education).

TKM College of Arts and Science, Kollam, is dedicated to fostering social responsibility among students through extension activities promoting community welfare. These initiatives, spearheaded by the NSS, NCC, and Community Services Cell (CSC), address societal issues while encouraging active student participation and holistic development. The NSS units focus on palliative care, education, environmental conservation, and health awareness. Notable programs include the Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan, a cleanliness drive in Karicode, and a Voice Donation Campaign to create audiobooks for visually impaired students. Other initiatives include oral cancer detection camps, AIDS prevention programs, and the Sahapadikkoru Veedu project, which built a home for a family in need. The NCC units actively contribute to eco-conservation, tree planting, blood donation, and cataract surgery camps. Through the SPARSH Program, cadets support differently-abled individuals and the elderly. The CSC coordinates impactful projects such as disaster response, adopting a government school, and tailoring training for women at Mahila Mandiram. During the Kerala floods, the college raised ₹56 lakh for the CMDRF and actively participated in rescue and relief operations.

Through these efforts, the college instills social values in students, shaping a generation committed to service and equity.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college offers robust infrastructure to support academic and research excellence. It features 45 classrooms, a Seminar Hall, and a Conference Hall, all equipped with Wi-Fi/LAN and advanced teaching tools like LCD/Smart TV/Smartboards. Five Computer Labs with 180 computers enhance digital learning. The institution has 17 specialized laboratories for UG, PG, and research, including six Chemistry Labs, four Physics Labs, three Biochemistry Labs, one Zoology Lab, and three Botany Labs, all equipped with state-of-the-art facilities.

Specialized labs like the Material Science Lab, Laser Optics Lab, Molecular Biology Lab, and Microbiology Lab in Physics, Botany, and Biochemistry support advanced research. The RUSA-funded research block houses a High-Temperature Instruments Lab, a Processing and Fabrication Lab, and a High-Performance Computing Lab. The DST-FIST scheme partially funds the Chemistry, Mathematics, and Physics Departments, while the SERB DST-funded Stem Cell Lab strengthens research in life sciences.

The campus features cutting-edge equipment, such as UV-visible spectrophotometers, FTIR Spectrophotometers, and X-ray Diffractometers. The Biodiversity Park includes an herbal garden, aviary, fern house, and fish pond with RAS and Aquaponics. Museums of Botany and Zoology enrich learning, while CCTV-equipped examination halls ensure a secure environment for academic activities.

internet connectivity, ensuring seamless access to up-to-date information, which is crucial in the information age. The digital library provides access to over 6,000 online journals, 2,000 e-books through UGC and INFLIBNET, and thousands of open-access journals and databases. In addition to conventional services like lending programs and reference services, the library has introduced many value-added services, including interlibrary loans, online information delivery, email alerts, and an online renewal system.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure**4.3.1 - Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi**

The college offers advanced ICT and digital facilities to support academic and administrative excellence. High-speed internet is ensured through a 50 Mbps BSNL leased line and 20 Mbps bandwidth under the NMEICT Project using optical fiber. Classrooms and computer labs have LCD projectors, Smart TVs, Smart Boards, and Wi-Fi/LAN. Five computer labs with 180 computers maintain a 10:1 student-to-computer ratio. A digital library with 13 workstations provides additional resources for research and learning.

The college implements DigiColaccess, a customized Digital LMS in MOODLE, under the government of Kerala's "Let's Go Digital Scheme." Faculty benefit from G-Suite accounts, which enable access through the college domain. Since 2019, the institution has been recognized as a local chapter of SWAYAM-NPTEL and promotes online learning. As part of the Virtual Labs Nodal Center Program by MHRD, the college enables hands-on digital experimentation.

A Network Institute of IIRS (ISRO) offers remote sensing and geoinformatics courses. As a premium ICT Academy of Kerala member, the institution provides ICT skill training to faculty and students. These initiatives and a well-maintained website highlight the college's commitment to using technology in education and administration. The institution consistently upgrades its IT facilities to meet the evolving academic and administrative requirements.

The institution is deeply committed to gender equity, believing it leads to equality. The college hosts three Kerala NCC Army Girls Wings, ensuring robust female participation. Through the Mithra Women Cell, Women's Studies Unit, Gender Sensitization Cell, Gender Equity Cell, NCC, and NSS, various awareness programs and campaigns foster gender sensitivity and equity. The Jeevani Centre for student well-being ensures the overall mental health and well-being of students. The "Happy Kollam Project," launched in collaboration with the Nila Foundation, aims to prevent suicides by providing mental health support and counseling to students, teachers and parents fostering a supportive campus environment.

In collaboration with ICAR- CMFRI, TKM College of Arts and Science has initiated Cage Culture, the first student startup at the college, led by seven SC students. Safety measures for female students include 24/7 security, CCTV cameras, & mandatory ID card display. A professionally qualified counselor supports the mental health of all students. The college offers safe accommodation for female students in a well-maintained hostel, equipped with a waiting room with toilets, a napkin vending machine, and an incinerator. Additionally, there is a well-equipped sick room,

gymnasium, and daycare center adjacent to the campus.

The college is committed to adhering to the Green Protocol and strictly follows the 3R principles of Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle in all its activities. Regular cleanliness drives are organized to collect waste, and color-coded dustbins are placed on every floor for the segregated disposal of plastic, food, and paper waste. A 1-ton capacity biogas plant converts food waste into energy. An incinerator in the waiting area burns non-reusable paper and napkin waste. The college partners with Haritha Karma Sena for solid waste collection, including chemicals. Students and faculty are encouraged to use steel lunch boxes and glasses. Organic waste is converted into manure using a vermicompost pit. Water wastage is minimized by repairing leaks, using drip irrigation for

gardening, and redirecting wastewater to gardens. Chemical solvents are refined and reused, with remaining substances properly diluted and discharged. Electronic devices are regularly maintained. The college has an agreement with Haritha Karma Sena of Kottamkara Grama Panchayat for e-waste collection. Rainwater harvesting and a water treatment plant are implemented to maximize water resource efficiency.

Since its establishment in 1965, T. K. M. College of Arts and Science has been dedicated to both academic and non-academic excellence, while fostering civic consciousness. The institution's vision, mission, and core values aim to nurture students into 'good citizens' through the 'Good Citizen' Project, which includes the T. K. M. Other activities include school adoption, collaboration with the blind federation, and building houses for the needy.

The proposed initiatives to enhance the institution's capabilities and student opportunities:

Employability and Innovation: Conduct programs to boost students' employability, innovation, and entrepreneurial spirit in collaboration with departments and clubs.

Alumni Engagement: Expand the parent alumni drive to enroll recent graduates and mobilize alumni for infrastructure augmentation.
